

Living Large in Small Spaces

The Historical Society of Palm Desert, in partnership with Modernism Week, offered the third annual **sold-out** walking tour on February 22nd and 23th, 2024 in South Palm Desert. On February 23rd, the 5:00 p.m. local news on NBC had a clip of the tour: <https://nbcpalmsprings.com/2024/02/23/living-large-in-small-spaces-walking-tour/>

Walking Tour registration began at Hugh Kaptur's historically-designated Kings Point condominiums on Shadow Mountain. The tour wended throughout the Painters' Path area just south of The Sandpiper. Along the way we saw homes by Patten and Wild, Walter S. White and John P. Moyer, as well as those designed by over 20 different contractors and builders in the area at the time.

This lovely (photo right) 1300 square foot Walter White has all of his hallmarks: the house is angled on the lot, a corner mitered window, clerestory windows, large overhangs, wing walls, large panes of sliding glass inviting indoor outdoor living, center ridge beams in a low-pitched roof, two



flanking outrigger beams and the corner of the eaves at a 45-degree angle. This home is just one of at least nine Walter Whites on Hedgehog and in the area, and constitutes a true Modernist living museum.

Gracious homeowners Kim and Ken Jones invited us into their home in Kings Point. We also saw interiors of William Krisel's Sandpiper (Gene and Pam McGuire) and Bissner Sr.'s and Robert Pitchford's Sands and Shadows 2 (Jim Capronigro and Colleen Kelly, homeowners, photo left). We also had the privilege of viewing a Walter White home

on Hedgehog, as well as the grounds of Sandpiper Circle 13 and Sands and Shadows 1. The walkers had a chance to see how the deliberate policy of the Palm Desert Corporation and subsequently, the city, ensured lively, varied neighborhoods and condominium developments that offered opportunities for those who wished to live in smaller homes. The average home is between 1200 and 1400 square feet. With the expanding middle class, these homes were an important addition to mid-20th century South Palm Desert.

We are grateful to the homeowners who so generously shared their space and enlightened us about Living Large in Small Spaces.



HSPD Architecture and Design Committee Report

The Architecture and Design (A&D) Committee consists of HSPD Board members and other interested HSPD members. For the last three years our walking tours in Shadow Mountain and Painters' Path have been our focus. One of our goals has also been to develop files on historic homes and architects. This season five small pamphlets were designed by committee member and architect Charlie Franks, which are available at the Historical Society. More will be developed in the future as we continue our research. If you are interested in meeting other like-minded HSPD members who have a passion for architecture, we would welcome you to the A&D Committee. Here are some other notes about activities we have been engaged in. Along with the Frey Symposium, Modernism Week featured great lectures. Particularly enjoyable were the ones on Sunnylands' interior designer, Billy Haines and another on an early California modernist architect, Irving Gill. But the highlight, undoubtedly, was our own Luke Leuschner's excellent and thought-provoking lecture on the Palm Desert Corporation.

Drawing on our archives and using primary source material, including film clips, Luke delivered an engaging and lively lecture. He highlighted the developmental vision of Cliff Henderson, but he also stressed the environmental struggles of Randall Henderson, Cliff's brother, to maintain the integrity of the desert. He opened with Randall's famous article in Desert Magazine about the "two deserts". The contrast between the two brothers couldn't have been more striking. Our Archivist Rochelle McClune, who has worked with Luke extensively, was also in attendance. Luke graduates from Berkley in May and is returning there for graduate work in the Fall.

David Toltzmann, HSPD Vice President and A&D Committee member and I alternate attending the Coachella Valley Preservation Committee which meets quarterly in the Henderson Building. The group, under Robert Zafran, consists of representatives from the cities throughout the valley. We share information about education and advocacy in our communities. The recently renovated Max Wilcockson house, Walter White, designer, was one of the presentations given by our Indio colleagues in March. Meanwhile, enjoy the rest of the season. Checklist: Research Your Home

Home & Property

1. Visit the [County Recorders office](#), a Title Company, friendly realtor or paid site to get the Original Grant Deeds for the property.
2. Online address search:
 - A. [Riverside County Property Search](#)
 - B. Real Estate Listings via [Redfin](#), [Zillow](#), [Realtor](#)
 - C. [Google Maps](#) - look at image history
 - D. [MCM Google Map](#) - updated occasionally with historic information
 - E. [UCSB aerial photo collection](#) & [LA Library Aerial Photograph Collection](#) to see how the footprint of the building has changed over time.
3. Determine if any subsequent work has been done on the property:
 - A. Get permits from the County Recorder's office or the city
 - B. Check old newspapers - they used to publish permit information
4. [Historical Society of Palm Desert](#) - if the property is in Palm Desert, there are "in person" resources available at HSPD including a cache of 1950's-1960's job cards.

Previous Owners

5. County Recorder's office or the city
6. Old Phone Books - lists names & addresses ([PS phone books online](#))
7. Old Social Registers - lists names, addresses and social club information
8. [ancestry.com](#) and census records
9. [archives.com](#)
10. If you want to find the first person to buy the land from the US Government, check [Bureau of Land Management](#) to find the "original owner" of the property
